THIS MONTH IN THE HIVE -DECEMBER

The warmer December temperatures we've been having mean that our bees are still venturing out and about to look for forage. However, the availability of nectar and pollen bearing flowers have massively reduced along with the numbers of foraging bees but the bees still come out of the hive on bright days to collect water.

But importantly we should still be monitoring the hive to ensure there is a sufficient

food supply.

Make sure you have some fondant to hand in case you need quickly.

During December:

- Monitor the hive entrance for build up of dead bees and blockages.
- Wedge up the back of the hive to ensure the floor slopes gently forwards.
- Ensure the roof is

secure; bricks, blocks and/or a strap will do the job.

Gently heft (lift) the

hive to check food weight, if light put block of fondant over the feedhole, a shallow eke may be needed.

Record your observa-

tions for each hive in a book or record card each time you visit them, this is more reliable than a memory!

THE BEES KNEES - COCKTAIL



Ingredients:

- ♦ 2 tsp Honey
- ♦ 50ml Gin
- ♦ 25ml Lemon Juice
- ♦ lce
- Lemon Zest strip to serve

Method:

Step I: Put the honey in a small jug or cup and add I tsp freshly boiled water. Stir well until smooth and the honey is nicely thinned down.

Step 2: Pour the honey mixture into a cocktail shaker along with the Gin,

lemon juice and a large handful of ice. Shake until the outside of the shaker feels very cold.

Step 3: Double strain into a cocktail glass or a coupe and garnish with a curled strip of lemon zest – you can do this by wrapping it tightly around a spoon handle.

CHOCOLATE AND HONEY TRUFFLES

Ingredients:

- ♦ 65g Cashew nuts
- ♦ Itbsp Cacao powder
- ♦ I tbsp Honey
- Extra Cacao powder for dusting

Method:

Step 1: Blitz nuts in a food processor until fine pieces.

Step 2: Add remaining ingredients, blend until mixture sticks together.

Step 3: Divide mixture into 8 equal pieces and roll into balls.

Method: cont

Step 4: Place into fridge for about an hour until set.

Step 5: Roll in Cocao powder.

Store in fridge
